There are few nursery rhymes that have quite stuck with me over the years of my life as well as this one. Have you ever wondered why he was lingering at the top of that wall in the first place? As a relative expert in climbing over the chain-link boundaries of my elementary school playground, I learned early on that straddling the top of the fence for any longer than necessary could result in unusual pain. Common sense tells us to come down on one side of the divide or the other. As a child I wondered, *doesn't he know better?* 

These days I am willing to concede that maybe Humpty Dumpty was up there looking for a change in perspective. *And who can blame him, really?* Or perhaps, having climbed the wall for reasons that were unknown even to him, he then struggled to figure out how to get over it. Life can be funny that way. Nevertheless, the real surprise of the story is not the inevitable fall of this pitiful character. That much we could have foreseen. No, the real surprise is that neither he, his friends, nor the local authorities had the ability to heal and restore him back to his original condition by themselves.

There are some things that just cannot be 'fixed' by our own power. Lord, help us!

Simple as it is, the story resonates with a particular grain of truth. We all fall. We all experience brokenness in one way or another. We've all tried to sit on the fence at some point—in our relationships and in our priorities—and found it to be all but impossible for very long.

Jesus said as much: *you cannot serve two masters* (Matthew 6:24). As did Joshua: *choose this day whom you will serve* (Joshua 24:15).

And then there is the counsel of King David, who knew what it meant to be broken and then eventually put back together again: *do not put your trust in princes, in mortals, in whom there is no help* (Psalm 146:3).

So much for all the king's horses and all the king's men!

In our Fall Stewardship campaign for 2023, we are reimagining what it means to be *whole* as the people of God. In doing so, we are also looking to lay aside the distraction of unfruitful 'problem-solving' and embrace instead the hope of spiritual renewal. I believe that God is with us in this work and without reservation.

And what of our response to the faithful generosity of God? At a time when the church is still recovering from the scars of the pandemic, and now looking to navigate and heal from the self-inflicted wounds of denominational unrest, the leaders of this congregation intend to roll up our liturgical sleeves and proclaim with boldness the vision of a unified, Christ-centered, mission-minded, Spirit-led family of faith here at Fairhope United Methodist Church. This future excites me!

Hear O, (Fairhope)! The Lord is One. You shall love the Lord your God with ALL your heart, and with ALL your soul, and with ALL your might (Deuteronomy 6:4-5).

Now is the time! We are the Church! So let us LEAD a life worthy of the calling we have received!
